

Criminal Justice Education in Our Schools

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Introduction

It is a tragedy when one of our school's graduates chooses to exist in a career of crime. Do our schools train our young adults to pursue a life of crime during enrollment and after graduation? Do our grammar school graduates and high school graduates know what they are doing when they begin to experiment with illegal drugs and crimes that involve firearms?

Why is it that law enforcement only gets involved when it is too late? That is when the student or the graduate goes off the wall and starts committing crimes. Law enforcement starts to detect this and begin the process of arresting and prosecuting our students and graduates.

The role of the Criminal Justice System in our lives should be to prevent our kids and young adults to escape the brutality of incarceration. Our criminal justice system should detect high-risk students and should try to help them to have the best possible chance of convincing them to never commit crimes.

Substance abuse and a career as a drug dealer and/or drug kingpin is a disaster for our young adult graduates and adult graduates on the streets of our communities. Who trains our young adults to resort to a life of incarceration because no one was there for them when they made the simple mistake of turning to substance abuse and to drug dealing to make a living.

Our Criminal Justice System should spend more time on trying to teach our children and young adults about the consequences of substance abuse and of dealing drugs on the streets as dealers and kingpins. Our Criminal Justice System should be trying to keep our graduates out of incarceration. We cannot continue to promote ignorance among our mentalities of our students that makes them believe that substance abuse and drug dealing can be good careers for them.

It is the responsibility of our schools when students become so detached from God that they do not care whether they are hurting themselves and/or if they are hurting others. God does not play any role in their lives as far as they are concerned. God cannot help students and graduates that are completely detached from Him to avoid self-destruction and to fulfill their willingness to hurt others.

Our Criminal Justice System does not have enough sympathy for our students to have mentors to go into every classroom in the United States to trash illegal drugs, tobacco, alcohol, and/or firearms. Maybe they need to fill a yearly quota about how many people that they need

to prosecute every year. Maybe there is a secret caste system in this society that give some people their freedom while giving others their unending presence in incarceration.

The main goals of the Criminal Justice System are to educate our young adults about what crimes not to commit and to keep our kids, young adults, and graduates from facing as life of crime and incarceration.

Teaching Criminal Justice Issues to Students

Criminal Justice Training Is Part of Education

We must train kids and young adults about the dangers of committing crimes and breaking rules as a very young age. We must help our students to understand that they have nothing to gain by continuing to pursue a career in crimes that would lead them to disappear from the face of the Earth.

The Criminal Justice System cannot see the incarceration of a human beings that God created and that He brought into the world wasting away in incarceration. Why cannot anyone warn our students that committing crimes would lead them to a lifetime of incarceration? They care about arresting people after they have committed crimes. Why do they not care about education high-risk kids and young adults so that they will know better than to commit a crime.

God wants to help us to understand that incarceration does nothing to benefit humanity. God wants us to know that all our students deserve criminal justice training. Our kids and young adults must feel that the courts and law enforcement officers love them. Kids and young adults want to believe that courts and law enforcement officers want to help them to avoid committing crimes and to help them to avoid being arrested and of doing time in incarceration.

We must go into our schools to teach our students the truth about the most common crimes that kids and young adults will make. God has obligated the Criminal Justice System to educate our students at all levels of education to help them to understand the most common crimes that kids and young adults will make. These mentors will give students help in developing strategies to reject committing crimes. We owe guidance, love, and affection so that our fellow brothers and sisters will not leave us by disappearing into incarceration.

Training Students about Crimes

Students walk around in their grammar schools and in their colleges without having any idea about what a crime really is. Our students do not know how a crime can cause a student to injure himself or herself, to injure others, and to injure God.

Using illegal drugs is a crime that hurts a young adult and God. God is very sad when His young adults begin to experiment with the use of illegal drugs. God is sad when one of His young adults faces incarceration. God is devastated when His young adults and adults destroy themselves by engaging in substance abuse and in drug dealing.

Our educators and our criminal justice system must educate their students the right way so that God's kids will not keep committing crimes that will continue to injure themselves and to injure Humanity. It would be better to get psychiatric treatment for these individuals that pose a risk to

themselves and to the community. We can no longer tolerate allowing our students to disintegrate because no one was there to give them the criminal justice training that they could have used to understand so that he or she would have rejected his or her intent to commit the crime.

Criminal justice training should become an essential part of the course offerings of all the grammar schools and high schools in the United States. These programs would reduce criminal activity and would save the lives of hundreds-of-thousands of persons that would never commit a crime.

Mentors and Substance Abuse Training

Our substance abuse disaster must end in our grammar schools and in our high schools. Even private and religious school would benefit from federally funded programs that would work to protect students from the demons of substance abuse.

Our Substance Abuse Mentors would stand before our kids and young adults and would tell them the truth. Substance abuse is a dead end that can make you disappear for the rest of your lives. Substance abuse amounts to a sustained suicide attempt.

Criminal Justice Mentors could do other roles to play in our schools. Our mentors would discourage our students from ever working off the books for any business. These mentors would discourage our kids and young adults from using alcohol and tobacco. These mentors would help our students to find the Spirit of God in Our Criminal Justice System.

Mentors would help students to understand that raping an under aged boy or an under aged girl is not something that courts will tolerate. A young boy that rapes and violates a young adult girl could face incarceration.

Mentors could explain why no student should ever need to use a weapon in their lives unless your profession requires that you use a firearm. Firearms can only be used for two purposes. They can injure someone or they can kill someone. Mentors would not encourage a young adult to ever use a firearm because one pull of the trigger could cause the young adult to lose his or her freedom for the rest of his or her life.

It is very important to have a Criminal Justice Mentor that can act as a role model that can help them to understand facts of life when it comes to understanding how to reject committing crimes and working hard to be a law-abiding citizen of their community.

Student Role Playing Crimes

Mentors can show students how a drug deal works or how an armed robbery works.

One student could act as a drug dealer. The other student would act as the buyer. They would talk about what kind of drugs that the buyer wants and how much it would cost to buy the drugs. Two kids would play narcotics officers that would be watching the deal.

The buyer would agree to buy seven baggies of meth for thirty dollars. The dealer agrees to it. The exchange takes place. The two narcotics officers move in to arrest the drug dealer and the buyer.

This is like what happens on the streets. It shows how a drug dealer exploits the addiction of a substance abuser to make a deal for the sale of illegal drugs. It also shows that law enforcement closes

in on drug deals and on drug dealers very quickly. They do not remain very free for very long. They do face incarceration for dealing drugs and for buying drugs quickly.

Our students must understand that they must reject any request by any peers or any adults to commit a crime. They should be encouraged to talk to a Criminal Justice Mentor to try to understand whether what they want to do is legal if they are confused. No one wants any of our young adults to be arrested only because they did not know any better.

Self-Inflicted Injuries and Crimes

All our young adults hurt themselves when they commit crimes. They could be buying drugs. They could be working off the books. They could be programmed to use violence by an organized crime family. They can traffic drugs. They can launder money on behalf of drug dealers and of members of an organized crime family. They can even agree to commit a homicide at the request of a drug kingpin or at the request of a member of an organized crime organization.

Our students can begin to destroy themselves when they fantasize about committing these types of crimes. They become more detached from their education when they have an intent to commit crimes in adulthood. They become more detached from God as they dream about hurting themselves and by hurting others by committing crimes. They become more detached from Humanity when they persistently express the need to injure other human beings.

Our schools cannot just allow a student to disintegrate into a state where he or she will emerge into a state where he or she will do something drastic to try to hurt himself and/or to hurt others. Educators and parents must see the warning signs that their child and young adult are becoming so withdrawn that they need psychiatric treatment and psychotherapy.

The main goal of sending a student into psychiatric care is to try to help a student to emerge into a human being that will not show the intent to want to hurt himself or herself. The student will hopefully will no longer have the intent to hurt others.

We must ask psychiatrists and psychotherapists to intervene when we need to save a student's life by stopping him or her from realizing an intent to hurt himself or herself and/or to hurt others.

Students Must Report Crimes

It is very painful for any student to see a peer trying to hurt himself or herself by committing a crime like using illegal drugs or drinking alcohol.

Criminal Justice Mentors would have to explain something that is very important to understand. All students are obliged to report any crimes that they see supporting and effort to hurt oneself and/or to hurt others to 911 and to the police department.

That means that a student that discovers a peer that has a weapon or that is coming to school high on drugs must tell the teacher about that peer and the police department about that peer. Our students must report the actions of any peer that must do with anything that resembles a crime and self-destructive behaviors.

We need to help our severely ill peers by getting them psychiatric care and psychological counseling when they become a threat to themselves and/or a threat to others.

We show love for our fellow peers when care enough to get them help by reporting their efforts to commit crimes to their teacher and to the police department.

Students try to show love for each other when they try to get a fellow peer help when that peer needs substance abuse counseling and psychiatric care. Our students must do everything that we can to help our sick peer by reporting his or her efforts to engage in substance abuse and in other crimes.

Our Crimes and God's Pain

God feels emotional pain when he sees any evidence that any of His kids and/or young adults are trying to hurt himself or herself and/or others. We do not hear God crying. We do not see God's tears. We do not hear him when He asks Himself what He could have done better to have prevented a tragedy that involved kid or young adult that just failed on Him.

God cries very much when He sees that law enforcement officers have activated their need to use a weapon against someone who is perceived to be a threat to the community. The greatest pains that God could feel from our Criminal Justice System is for law enforcement officers to justify the use of a weapon to injure and/or to kill a suspect in the commission of a crime. No one understands God's grief when police officers cause a wrongful death when their mission is "To Serve and To Protect" the Community.

These types of tragedies happen because our schools have not been training our kids and young adults to understand what constitutes the commission of a crime. We have not been training our kids to understand that threatening anyone with a firearm can lead to your death. Our kids and young adults do not understand that a life of crime is not a career. The local and federal authorities will arrest you for committing crimes eventually.

God hurts when police officers must arrest a suspect that has indicted for committing a murder. No crime that we can commit against Humanity hurts God more than an act of murder. God cannot replace a loved one that has left us. A wrongful death disrupts Humanity all over the world.

God does not want us to know about what He wants to do to us when we make Him suffer by committing crimes such as murder, suicide, and other crimes that injure others when He cannot stop crying.

Correctional Facilities Guided Tours

Our students must gain exposure to where they would be living if they pursue a life of crime. They must see the standard of living of incarceration. They must understand the social environment that they will adapt to when they can call a prison and/or a correctional facility his or her home.

Our kids and young adults should see the desperate self-destruction that inmates in these facilities have suffered through. Our students would see how their lives have been destroyed. Our students would see the end results of pursuing a career as a drug dealer or as a substance abuser.

They would see the end results of using a weapon to rob a check cashing store or a bank. They would see what happens to members of gangs that make a living by working off the books. They can see what happens to murderers and rapists that that devastate God with their violence against all of us.

Our kids and young adults would understand where you will eventually be living if you want to work for organized crime off the books. God wants all our kids and young adults to know what awaits them if they follow an order from a commander of an organized crime family to commit murder against an antagonist of the organized crime family.

God wants our kids and young adults to go home from a guided tour through a correctional facility and to have nightmares and panic attacks about committing crimes for the rest of their lives.

Police Officers Are Students' Friends

Police officers love to have the duty and the opportunity to protect kids and young adults from the dangers that might hurt them in the community. Police officers do not want to arrest anyone. Police officers want to exist in a state of peace with the communities in which they serve.

Kids and young adults must feel free to talk to police officers if the kids and young adults sense that someone, such as a peer, is breaking the law or is hurting himself or herself. All kids and young adults should know how to go to the police department to inform the police officers that a peer, a friend, and/or a loved one is considering doing something drastic to hurt himself or herself and/or others.

We are obligated to try to stop a peer from attempting to commit suicide. We have an obligation to protect the community against mentally ill citizens that may feel the need to injure God and to injure Humanity. Our kids and young adults must be able to go to the police department when they sense that something is going to go seriously wrong.

We want to work with police officers to help others that are a threat to themselves to get psychiatric treatment and to also receive psychological evaluation and treatment. We can work with law enforcement to save people's lives by getting them help when it is clearly apparent that they need life-saving psychiatric medical treatment.

We must work with police officers to help them to protect the community. We must teach our kids and young adults that God and the Holy Spirit also work with law enforcement officers to help those of us in the community that may be a threat to themselves and/or a threat to others.

We must be thankful that our police officers protect our students and our communities. We must remember that God guides the criminal justice system to succeed in helping us to live normal lives.

We Must Show Remorse for Our Sins

God is a forgiving supreme being. God loves us enough to forgive us for practically anything that we will do wrong.

However, how do we stand in front of God and in front of the Criminal Justice System to show remorse for the way that we have hurt God and for the way that we have hurt the community?

We can apologize to the courts for what we have done wrong. We can promise to attempt to never make the same mistake again. We can agree to accept a more painful punishment if law enforcement officers catch any of us trying to engage in the same criminal behaviors. We can explain that we will work with God to get extra guidance that will help us to understand that we cannot commit the same crimes again.

Remorse is an agreement between ourselves and the Criminal Justice System that is approved by God that a kid and/or young adult will not face further punishment for committing a crime because of the promise that the student has made to never commit the same crime again.

We would prefer an expression of remorse that would allow a student a better chance at becoming retaining his or her freedom by showing remorse as opposed to not showing remorse.

Students and Accepting Help from God

All students have a personal relationship with God. Students respond to the help of God all the time. There are times when God is the only resource for help that a student with whom a student can talk.

Students are intelligent when they try to understand how to solve a problem by going to God and by communicating with God through prayer and through a series of conversations. There is nothing wrong with having a conversation with God. There is nothing wrong with relying on the love that God has for all of us to try to end our pain and suffering.

It is scary for a student to carry out the will of God. It is treacherous to carry out His instructions to help a student to achieve his or her goals and to begin to resolve the student's problems. Students come to understand that God is a loving being that always has a way to help us when we have no way to find a legitimate strategy that will help us to solve our problems.

It is more difficult when a student complains to God that someone is hurting the student for no justifiable reasons. God then must make the decision as to whether to hurt the aggressive student. It hurts God to hurt someone in response to prayer and communications with a student.

God will not tolerate any student that would cause any pain and suffering for any other students in a school without facing discipline for it. Something is wrong with a school if an aggressive student that causes conflict and that tries to hurt other students is not properly disciplined. God does not allow that for very long.

Implementing God's will and advice should be a peaceful experience that will help a student to find a final resolution that will put an end to the student's conflicts and suffering.

The bottom line is that God tries to steer students away from committing crimes to solve problems. That is beneficial for the student, the student's peers, the school, and the student's family.

Understanding the Consequences of Crimes

Prison and Juvenile Detention

Our kids and young adults commit crimes without understanding that they are committing crimes. They do not understand that they are subject to being arrested for committing a crime. They have no idea that law enforcement can send them to prison or to juvenile detention.

That must change. Our students must understand the types of crimes that kids and young adults can commit both in schools and outside of schools. They really need to come to understand prison and juvenile detention. They need to see movies about prisons and juvenile detention facilities. They must understand that it is important to work with both God and criminal justice mentors to avoid the devastation of being arrested and sent to prison or to a juvenile detention facility.

Who teaches our kids and young adults about what behaviors and actions are legal and which behaviors and actions are illegal? Is it God's responsibility to babysit or kids and young adults because they might encounter numerous opportunities to commit crimes that would warrant their arrest on a weekly basis?

Our schools are at fault when they do not train our kids and young adults about what constitutes a crime as opposed to what constitutes a careless mistake. We cannot continue to graduate students that have no way of understanding how the criminal justice system works. We must explain exactly why police officers will arrest kids and young adults. We must teach our kids and young adults about how to avoid prison and juvenile detention by teaching them to be smart by educating them to not commit crimes in our schools and in our communities.

Suspension and Expulsion from School

Suspension and expulsion from classes can be a death sentence for any kids and young adults that must face that kind of discipline.

The Constitution of the United States tries to protect all of us from facing cruel and unusual punishment when we are arrested and when we must be sentenced to serve time in a prison.

However, destroying a student's academic career and leaving the student without a grammar school diploma and/or a high school diploma is the cruelest punishment that our schools can inflict upon a student. It is so severe that it could basically destroy a student's life. A student that faces either suspension or expulsion may never be able to work, to have a career, or even to be able to support a family with a spouse and children.

No student deserves that kind of devastation that can destroy his or her life. It is a death sentence that our students do not deserve under any circumstance. Our criminal justice system and our educators answer to a One True God that expects them to forgive, to love, and to provide psychiatric care for those kids and young adults that do outrageous things. We cannot justify this type of punishment against our kids and young adults under any circumstances except when the students use life-threatening violence in school. God wants to forgive our students that get into trouble. God wants our educators and criminal justice system to forgive them also without injuring them with a suspension or an expulsion that would destroy a student's life.

Arrests and Indictments

It is very important for our kids and young adults to understand how law enforcement and the criminal justice system work together.

Our kids and young adults must understand that a person is handcuffed and is arrested when police officers have enough evidence to support a complaint that alleges that the suspect has committed a crime. They can then transport the suspect to prison.

Police officers that see a suspect is simply a threat to himself or herself and is possibly a threat to others without evidence that the person has committed a crime can admit the suspect into a psychiatric facility for a certain amount of time for a psychiatric evaluation.

An indictment is when a grand jury believes that there is enough evidence to support the assertion that a certain person has committed at least one crime. The suspect is arrested and pleads either guilty or not guilty to the charges in the indictment. Then the suspect is incarcerated or he or she is released on parole pending the next court hearing.

Why do our kids not understand these basic concepts about our criminal justice system? Our grammar schools and high schools do not think that it is important to help students to understand what happens when a student is arrested or when a graduate of a grammar school or a high school is indicted?

Maybe some educators want our students to graduate from grammar school and high school in a state of ignorance. Our educators do not want to prepare our students for what they will really be facing in the real world. That must end with Education Reform that may happen in the future.

Substance Abuse Devastation

A substance abuse disorder can destroy a student's life. Our kids and young adults do not know just how dangerous substance abuse can be in their lives. Who teaches them that using illegal drugs can get them arrested and can destroy their lives?

Why do we not have Substance Abuse Awareness programs in all public and private schools that can help our students to understand the dangers and consequences of becoming a substance abuser.

Substance abusers lose their ability to function in relationships. They lose their ability to work in a job. They reach a point where they can no longer adequately raise their kids.

We must make our students aware of the devastation that awaits them if they choose to become a substance abuser or a drug kingpin. We must help them to understand that they will lose their spouse, that they will lose their kids, and that they will lose their jobs.

We must warn our kids and young adults about the incarceration that awaits them because of the need that they will have to buy dope on the streets. The end of substance abusers is when they must deal drugs to make a living. That is when they make their final mistakes. Narcotics officers arrest them. Their substance abuse habit has destroyed their lives. This is what we should be teaching to our kids.

Broken Relationships

How long can a female fiancé tolerate a male fiancé that feels the need to stay high on drugs? How long can a male fiancé support his substance abuse habit before his engagement with his female fiancé will end?

What if the fiancé or husband is involved in illegal activities? Does the boyfriend or husband work for a company that is off the books? Is the boyfriend laundering money for drug dealers and for the mob? Is the boyfriend dealing drugs? Is the boyfriend using illegal drugs? Is the boyfriend's drug habit so bad that the household is completely broke?

There comes a time when a woman must take her kids and must leave her boyfriend or her husband. There comes a time when the girlfriend or wife must decide to leave her boyfriend or husband with the kids. It is painful to see a relationship between a husband and a wife that could just collapse because of a husband's drug habit.

Why is it that we do not have courses that try to explain these issues about how committing crimes and becoming a substance abuser can destroy your relationship with your fiancé or your spouse? Why do we not teach our kids about the way that our lives fall apart when we commit crimes, become drug dealers, and resort to being a substance abuser to make a living?

We must develop courses for our grammar schools, middle schools, high schools, and colleges that really show the reality of the way that a husband's criminal behaviors can destroy a relationship. We must help our students to understand that it might not be worth it to marry a spouse that is a career criminal or that commits crimes and believes that he or she will never face being arrested for it.

We must show our students how to develop a relationship where the male and female will not disintegrate because of crimes and substance abuse problems.

Hurting God by Committing Crimes

God feels pain every time that we feel like hurting ourselves and/or like hurting others. God feels pain when He must work with the courts and local law enforcement officers to admit a psychiatric patient into a psychiatric unit because the patient has become a threat to himself or herself and/or to the community.

God feels like hurting us when we hurt Him by committing crimes. God must discipline us according to the severity of the damage that the suspect inflicted against himself, herself, and against the members of the community.

God is very hurt when a suspect shows no remorse for committing a crime and for the pain that the suspect has caused for God and for Humanity. It hurts God to see a suspect that has committed a crime that exists in a complete detachment from Him.

The criminal justice system does not fully understand God's suffering when His sons and daughter are sent into a dungeon where they get to do nothing for the rest of their lives. God knows that many inmates are eligible for rehabilitation and for reintroduction to society. God cannot support a criminal justice system that cannot give people that have committed crimes a second chance at life.

Violence with the Intent to Injure Others

Trying to physically injure another person or persons is not something that God, the criminal justice system, and law enforcement agencies will tolerate. Inflicting physical pain and suffering upon another human being warrants incarceration in a prison or in a juvenile detention center.

Who explains what the result of inflicting violence against another human being will be to a kid or a young adult? Who tells kids and young adults that they will be incarcerated if they try to attack someone? Who tells our kids and young adults that they will face incarceration if they use violence against another student? Why do we not explain these issues with our kids and young adults?

We must be honest with our kids and young adults. We must give them valuable advice. Go to the emergency room of the nearest hospital and admit yourself into a hospital with a psychiatric unit when you feel that your intent to hurt yourself and or to hurt others is justified. Go somewhere that is safe so that you can get psychiatric treatment for what is wrong with you.

It is much better to get psychiatric care from a psychiatrist and from a psychiatric facility than to go over the age and to spend your entire life in incarceration. We want all our kids and young adults to remain to be part of God's Human Family. WE want all our kids and young adults to stay free of self-destructive and destructive behaviors. We want our kids to build a lifetime attachment to God. We want to share in the love that we share with God in the way that we show love for our kids that might get into trouble.

We may have to work with our kids and young adults to find real solutions so that we can save their lives.

Law Enforcement Seminars

Our law enforcement officers should be able to talk to our students about the stressors that they face when they must protect the community out on the streets. They should talk about how police officers try hard to give kids and young adult as many chances as possible to get their acts together. Police officers should tell students that kids and young adults receive a certain number of warnings before law enforcement must take drastic action against them. Police officers must tell kids and young adults that arresting and incarcerating kids are the last resort when nothing else works to correct their behavioral problems.

The officers must talk to kids and young adults about the different types of drugs that exist out there. They must show kids about how drugs can destroy their lives. They must explain how there is no hope left for millions of substance abusers that just could not get the message from the doctors, the courts, and the law enforcement officers. Substance abuse and alcohol abuse would destroy their lives.

There is a new era that exists. This new ear will showcase a relationship between our students and law enforcement. This partnership will work to stop substance abuse before it starts. Kids, young adults, law enforcement officers, and the criminal justice system will work together to stop our kids from becoming substance abuser from the beginning. That will stop them from ever becoming substance abusers for the rest of their lives.

That is the most productive way to begin to end God's suffering over His substance abuse nightmare.

Substance Abuse Juvenile Education

Children, Young Adults, and Illegal Drugs

Substance abuse counseling and instruction should be part of every student's education in every school in the United States of America. Our Federal Government should mandate that all school should teach all our students about the dangers of illegal drugs, alcohol, and weapons. Our schools are not only obliged to teach our students about English Grammar and Algebra. Our schools must teach our kids about the facts of life. The facts of life must do with dealing with the reality that our students face on the streets before and after graduation.

Do our graduates understand what the at the substance of illegal drugs. Is there anyone in their schools that can teach them anything about what illegal drugs are and why they are illegal and dangerous? Do our kids and young adults know what a crack pipe is? Do they know anything of crack cocaine or about crystal meth? Why do so many of our students and graduates only find out about these drugs and their ability to destroy human lives after they have become substance abusers and have come to be addicted to these types of drugs?

Our schools must teach courses that are designed to save the lives of all our students that have much to do with the substance of illegal drugs and alcohol. Our students must make the decision as to whether they will pursue an addiction to illegal drugs and alcohol when they are children and young adults. Our students will be trained to understand that drugs and alcohol have absolutely no place in their lives. Our students must understand that God and the Holy Spirit want them to reject dope and alcohol. We should follow the advice of our Substance Abuse Training instructors that that our students' lives will be saved before and after graduation.

Teaching Students about All Drugs

Our students must understand what drugs are if they are going to reject drugs in the future. Our students receive training in what different types of drugs function. They should know how substance abusers take drugs. Our students should know what it means "to be high on drugs."

Our kids and young adults should see various instructional movies so that they will see how substance abusers take drugs to destroy themselves.

Our kids should see a substance abuser smoking crack cocaine with a crack pipe. They should see how substance abusers waste themselves by shooting up or injecting themselves with heroine. They should see what a what "a high on drugs" looks like for a crystal meth users.

Our students should see a wasted drug addict snorting cocaine. They should see what cocaine does to a person to get that person high. They should see the false feeling of happiness that cocaine users feel when they are arrested and sent to court-ordered rehabilitation.

What is substance abuse rehabilitation? What do addiction doctors and substance abuse treatment associates do for patients with substance abuse disorders? This is a last chance for most substance abusers. They either fix their problems there or they face incarceration in prison. The patients get a lot of advice and counseling to stay away from illegal drugs. The patients receive their final warnings about the price that they will pay for hurting themselves and for hurting others.

How Do Drug Dealers Disintegrate?

We can walk down the street of our community. We can spend two hours out there. We might not notice more than two police cars. We can especially notice this in high-risk area where the community has problems with drugs on the streets. They do not know that up to eighty percent of the police officers that patrol most neighborhoods ride in unmarked police vehicles so that no one will know that all drug dealers on the streets are under surveillance.

A traffic stop by an unmarked police car can identify a lot of drug and possibly a weapon in substance abuser's car. Narcotics officers interrogate the arrested individual. Finally, they find the drug kingpin that is a source of dope in a community. That is when SWAT and local law enforcement work to secure a search warrant for a drug kingpin. They then have the authorization from the courts to go after the drug kingpin in his or her home and to arrest him or her and/or them and to take out their operations.

What is the main problem with running an illegal drug business? They cannot report their income to the Internal Revenue Service. They cannot pay state sales taxes on what they sell. They cannot open a business bank account in a bank if all the drug dealer's income comes from off-the-books drug dealing. They have serious problems in trying to pay their bills if they must do it with just cash and with no credit cards or a debit card that is funded by an illegal drug business.

There will come a day when drug dealers and drug kingpins will find themselves in incarceration for most of their lives. Their ability to convince our young adults to and adults to destroy themselves with illegal drugs is disgraceful and warrants God's punishment. That is when drug dealers disintegrate and cease to exist from society.

Detecting a Bad Habit in Peers

It is our responsibility to try to work to get help and medical treatment for a peer once we detect that they peer is hurting himself or herself with illegal drugs, alcohol, and/tobacco. We must be intelligent when we deal with God. We must show love for God, for our family members, and for our peers. We must try to help our peers when they need our help the most. Students are also obliged to protect the students and the members of the community from what might happen if we detect an expression of the intent to injure others.

We must inform our teachers, our parents, and local law enforcement agencies about a student that has expressed the possible intent toward wanting to hurt himself or herself and/or to hurt others. We must try very hard to prevent a major tragedy by going to the local police department to tell them that a student may possibly be mentally ill and has expressed the intent to hurt others in the school and in the community.

We must try to save lives. That is more important than the consequences that our peer will face if he or she is committed into a psychiatric facility or if he or she is arrested. Our students must understand that it is their obligation to God and to Humanity to work to get psychiatric treatment and psychological evaluation and counseling when fellow students detect that this student may be ready to hurt himself or herself and/or to hurt others. Our students must try to obtain medical treatment for any student or peer that needs psychiatric care. God expects all of our students to carry out this commitment by helping Him to help our sick students that pose a threat to others.

Teaching Rejection of Peer Groups

All children and young adults want to participate in a peer group. That means that they want to be friends with mutual friends in a school. Normally, our kids and young adults would be working with sane peers in public schools, in private schools, and in religious schools. Most students would not have many problems about finding healthy peer relationships in schools.

However, there are many peer groups that exist both in schools and out of schools that are up to no good. Gangs are peer groups of kids and young adults that traffic drugs, work off-the-books, reject their education, and that like to work for organized crime before they are incarcerated for the rest of their lives.

The more mature students would try to enter a malicious peer group while not knowing the requirements of being accepted into the peer group and the requirements of continuing to exist in the peer group.

We have many mature students that pray a lot in our schools. We know better than to fall into a situation where their peers would ask them to try to hurt themselves and/or to hurt others. The basic advice that we would give to any mature student would be to reject any peer group whose members would encourage you to hurt yourself or to hurt others in any way. Our kids and young adults must reject peer groups that encourage us to ignore and to reject our education.

Our kids and young adults must reject any peer group that wants its members to possess and to possibly use weapons. Educators would not want a student to destroy his or her life by coming to school with a weapon or to commit a crime such as a bank robbery with a weapon.

It is better for students to remain without involvement with peer groups if there are no constructive peer groups that are available for the student in his or her school community. Students should never enter a peer group that would encourage a student to commit crimes. We must teach all students to reject these types of destructive peer groups.

A Smoke-Free Education

Our students see signs in convenience stores and gas stations all the time. It is illegal for minors to use tobacco products. What makes a twenty-year-old young adult different than an eighteen-year-old young adult?

There are many reasons why Substance Abuse Counselors should encourage our kids and young adults in our schools. Tobacco products come with a bad odor. They do bad things for a person's oral hygiene and for the smoker's physical hygiene.

Everyone knows that smoking can cause many types of cancer. The long-term use of tobacco can kill a smoker. Smoking can also promote the development of life-threatening lung diseases such as Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disorder.

Our students have nothing to gain by using tobacco products. The bad hygiene is bad for you. The risk of life-threatening diseases is bad for you. The bad taste that tobacco leaves in your mouth is not good for you. Many people that sit and stand around a smoker are offended by the foul odor of cigarette smoke. Our peers should just reject tobacco products and maintain clean hygiene habits.

Substance Abuse Disorder is an Illness

A Substance Abuse Disorder is an illness. We should teach our kids and young adults that substance abuse is a medical illness. It requires medical treatment to fight this illness and to with the battle against this illness.

Substance Abuse Disorder is a medical illness that a substance abuser can avoid. Are students should get an injection of a vaccine in their schools that would protect them from ever resorting to using illegal drugs, tobacco, and alcohol.

Why can we not find a vaccine for Substance Abuse Disorders in our schools? We must program our students to reject bad peer groups and to reject illegal drugs. We must help them to understand the ultimate consequences of doing dope on the streets for a living.

Education is a good vaccine for Substance Abuse Disorders. We must make sure that all our students understand that illegal drugs, alcohol, and tobacco are all dead ends that can destroy each one of us. We must draw the line and we must no longer allow our student to walk past it. The days are coming when education in our school will finally begin to put in substance abuse in the United States of America.

God's dream is that He will stop suffering with the way that people are scammed into using dope when they are kids and young adults. It must end that we will continue to allow our students to fall into a pool of quick sand and that they will not be able to save their own lives after they do it.

God wants this problem to end. God wants our students to stop becoming ill substance abusers. God wants this epidemic to end. God wants our family lives all over the world to be free of alcohol, illegal drugs, and tobacco.

We must be punishing drug dealers and substance abusers that are in business because they cannot find work anywhere else. We cannot be indifferent to the reality that they are starving and that they probably will never be able to work in a real job for the rest of their lives.

Our Graduates Will Be Clean and Sober

There will come a day when our schools with achieve salvation. They will teach students that will never use Illegal drugs. They will have students that will never use alcohol. They will have students that will never use tobacco.

Our schools will work with God through the relationships that He has with each one of His student, His educators, and His students' parents.

We will defeat substance abuse by going to God for help. We will defeat alcoholism by going to God for guidance and support.

All our graduates of all our schools will be certified experts in Substance Abuse Disorders issues. They will know how to reject illegal substances. They will be role models in our communities that will help our kids and young adults to make the right decisions about rejecting malicious substances that can hurt them. Our peer groups of the future will reject dangerous illegal substances and will and will reject any members that would want to use any illegal malicious substances.

Drinking and Driving Education

Why Do We Drink Alcohol?

There is no medical reason for drinking alcohol. Alcohol does not treat and/or cure any medical condition. Alcohol does cause psychiatric problems. Persons that have a lot of alcohol in their system can become lethargic and disoriented.

Why do commercials of sports games encourage our kids and young adults to use beer and hard liquor? How do our young adults respond when they are bombarded by messages that encourage them to drink beer and hard liquor? Do these commercials talk about the personal injuries that our kids and young adults can sustain if they were to drink beer and/or hard liquor before the age of twenty-one years old. Why do these commercials encourage our kids and young adults to drink alcohol when it can only make us extremely sick?

Why don't are schools teach our students to avoid alcohol until they become adults? How many schools teach young adults the dangers of driving under the influence of alcohol? How many schools talk to their students about alcohol abuse at all?

Alcohol has a very offensive odor and it causes offensive bad breath. Persons cannot function properly if they have become drunk and/or have overdosed on alcohol. What benefit do adults see in drinking these types of substances?

What may really offend God is the way that commercial for sports games on live television broadcast bombard our kids and young adults with pressure to become alcoholics and to experiment with the most destructive types of alcoholic beverages that could make bother our adults and young adults very sick. Alcohol manufacturers have no right to use commercials to encourage our kids to kill themselves with hard liquor and beer.

Is Alcohol a Bad Substance?

Alcohol has no medical or personal benefit for and child, young adult, and/or adult that attempts to drink it. Alcohol does not treat any illness. Alcohol is not a dietary supplement. Alcohol is not juice that comes from a fruit. Alcohol is not a vitamin drink,

Alcohol is a bad substance when a person that abuses it causes a life-threatening accident. Alcohol is a bad substance when an alcoholic person must be admitted into the hospital for overdosing and getting drunk on alcohol. Alcohol is a bad substance if it leads young adults to experiment with more powerful substances that could hurt them like illegal drugs.

Alcohol is a bad idea if law enforcement agents catch you trying to drive with a lethal level of alcohol in your bloodstream. Alcohol is a bad substance when using it before you start to drive causes you to lose your driver's license.

Alcohol is a bad problem when a wife files for divorce because of a husband's unending dream to get drunk fourteen hours of the day. Alcohol is a problem when a husband files for divorce because he can no longer tolerate the way that his wife always gets drunk. Our kids and young adults maybe facing the most incredible scam when commercials encourage them to use alcohol.

Peer Pressure and Alcohol

Peers that are unemployed and under aged students have nerve when they will ask their parents for the money to buy and to abuse alcoholic beverages. What kind of parents would want their under aged son or daughter to drink alcohol? Do they think that a minor that is in high school or that is in college could benefit from abusing illegal drugs?

Would parents want to give their son or daughter the authorization to use alcohol because his or her peer group in a college would require that kind of behavior to continue to function in a peer group? Could a student in a peer group be afraid that he or she will be rejected from the peer group if he or she refuses to drink alcohol?

Would parents want their son or daughter to reject peer groups that would require him or her to drink so that their son or daughter would lead a lonely existence on campus? Would they want their young adult son or daughter to just go to school to study without satisfying a mandate to get drunk in a dorm, a fraternity house, and/or in a sorority?

It is just a bad idea for college students to get drunk on alcohol. Peers may see no problem with it. However, there is no space on a resume for a college graduate to say that he accomplished that he or she drank three entire kegs of beer as an undergraduate in college. It is difficult to impress an employer if the company were to discover that a graduate was also an alcoholic despite his or her other accomplishments.

You must perform in a job if you are hired. Then the drinking and the smoking and the partying all come back to haunt you when you must perform in a job. Undergraduates should remain sober students and concentrate on preparing for reaching a job rather than on getting drunk.

A Wrongful Death and Drunk Driving

The most tragic disaster that can happen to anyone that drinks too much alcohol is to be in an accident that causes a wrongful death where a person loses his or her and/or their lives. It is a sad reality of just how dangerous alcohol can be. It is such a shame when alcohol causes a wrongful death. An alcohol related wrongful death just shows our young adults the justification as to why they should reject alcohol as a beverage once and for all.

We have the potential to cause life-threatening injuries and wrongful deaths when we drive under the influence of alcohol. We become potential murderers because we have a substance within us that makes us sick. This substance, alcohol, brings out the evil in us that makes us people that want to hurt ourselves and to hurt others.

A DUI accident that kills a human being is a tragedy that disrupts all the members of our human family. We do not see God's tears. We do not see his suffering. We do not see what God will try to do to rebuild that shattered lives that have been destroyed because someone drank too much alcohol and then tried to drive home after doing that.

We must be merciful with God. We must understand that God feels pain when our young adults in high schools and colleges hurt themselves by drinking alcohol. God wants undergraduates in our colleges and high schools to stay away from such a harmful substance. We hope that we will make the constructive decisions about alcohol in our lives and in the lives of our young adults.

Alcoholism Rehabilitation

There comes a time when all people that are addicted to alcohol must get medical treatment for their drinking habit. This happens at the end of a long process when the alcoholic has hurt himself or herself and his or her loved ones so much that the pain and suffering for all of them must end.

We wonder what alcohol does to someone that makes it such a desirable substance. We wonder why alcohol is so popular all over the world. We want to know the benefit that people feel during the drinking of alcohol and after they drink alcohol. People must have something to gain from using alcohol.

Alcoholics enter rehab for one reason. They do not understand that they have been wanting to hurt themselves for the entire time that they have been using alcohol. They have been suicidal. They have grown accustomed to hurting themselves repeatedly over time. They are mad at themselves for some reason.

They go into rehab because God does not want these individuals to face incarceration or death. God wants to try to work with addiction treatment specialists to get help for alcoholics. God wants them to understand that God does not tolerate suicidal behaviors in His sons and daughters. He will not allow any of us to succeed in continuing to try to hurt ourselves and to continue to hurt others by continuing to hurt ourselves.

They must come to an agreement with God that no one has the right to continue to injure themselves with any type of a malicious substance like alcohol for the rest of their lives. Rehab is a God's final warning that these individuals must stop poisoning themselves or they will face homelessness and/or incarceration.

They must make a commitment to stay off alcohol for the rest of their lives. There is no reason for them to need alcohol if it just brings them pain and suffering in the end.

The Consequences of Substance Abuse

We must discuss the consequences of alcohol abuse with our kids and young adults. We must find ways to explain end results of what our kids and young adults will face if they pursue a lifetime of alcoholism without realizing the way that they are destroying themselves. We can list a few of the consequences of not treating alcoholism as a dangerous illness.

1. A Loss of a Job
2. Divorce
3. Loss of a Driver's License
4. Arrest and Prosecution
5. Loss of a Car
6. Loss of Income
7. Increases in Insurance Premiums
8. Incarceration
9. Indictments
10. Prosecutions

Illegal Under Aged Drinking

All our students should understand that under aged drinking of alcohol is illegal. They should understand that God and the Holy Spirit are there for them when they must decide whether they will be drinking alcoholic beverages in their lives. God will not tolerate any behaviors in kids and young adults that would represent to be indefinite efforts to inflict harm upon themselves.

God does not want commercials and peer pressure to prepare our under aged students to feel that they must prepare for drinking when they reach the ages of eighteen to twenty-one years old. Students have more to gain by drinking soft drinks than by abusing alcohol. They must understand that they can lead productive lives without needing to get drunk to satisfy the requirements of peer pressure.

Our students should not go to parties where they are serving alcoholic beverages. Our students should avoid all possible opportunities to gain exposure to alcohol and to illegal drugs. Our students must work with God to remain healthy. God wants our undergraduate to mature into adults that will lead productive and powerful lives.

Our students should know that God is their best friend when it comes to getting guidance whenever a student gets sick. Do we go to a doctor? Do we use over-the-counter medications? Do we go to an emergency room? God can help us to make these decisions. We always hope that parents and God will work together to help our kids and young adults to make the right decisions about substance abuse and alcohol use.

Commitment into Psychiatric Facility

A Threat to Self and a Threat to Others

It is a sad story when a child or young adult becomes a threat to himself or herself and/or becomes a threat to others because of an undiagnosed mental illness or an untreated psychiatric disorder.

At least 60% of all crimes that prisoners commit must be related to some type of undiagnosed or untreated psychiatric disorder. Parents and educators sometimes do not notice the warning signs that a child or a young adult will need psychiatric treatment intervention to save his or her life. Psychiatrists are less likely to treat children and young adult for psychiatric disorders that to treat adults for psychiatric disorders.

Most psychiatric disorders begin to show up when a student is in high school. Parents and educators come to believe that a student's bad behaviors need discipline and punishment. That may be true if the student is misbehaving because of a life-threatening psychiatric disorder or a mental illness.

Hurting a student for being a threat to himself or herself and/or being a threat to others only makes the mental illness that the student suffers even worse. It makes no sense to punish a student for showing the symptoms of having an illness. It is much more constructive to treat the student with love and compassion and to get the student immediate psychiatric care before he or she becomes so ill that he or she will carry out an effort to hurt himself or herself and/or to hurt others.

Our schools must try to graduate students that have received humane and powerful psychiatric medical treatment that acts to deter the students from hurting himself, herself, and/or others. Our schools do not groom our students for homelessness and incarceration. Our schools prepare our students to find God by showing love for others and by receiving love for others. We cannot punish our students for misbehaviors when they are misbehaving because they have a medical illness. We must try to get them medical treatment for what illness is causing them to suffer.

Deciding to Commit a Juvenile

We must commit a student into a psychiatric facility when he or she does not want to cooperate with requests to be a voluntary patient that will cooperate with psychiatric treatment. The student has expressed recent intentions to harm himself or herself and/or to hurt others. The student might not want to respond to numerous offers of help from family members and from psychiatrists and mental health professionals to be sensible.

There comes a time when a psychiatrist and law enforcement officers must make the decision to admit the juvenile into a psychiatric facility and the student's will. They must negotiate with the student. They must try to help the student to understand the life that he or she will lead if he or she will continue to express intentions to hurt themselves and/or to hurt others.

There are times when young adults in grammar schools and in high schools need to take medications to help them to understand that they have an illness that wants to make them a treat to themselves and/or a threat to others. They must understand that their loved ones do not want them to spend the rest of their lives in incarceration in prison or in a psychiatric facility.

Rejecting Court-Ordered Treatment

Juvenile courts that deal with students that have presented themselves as threats to themselves and as threats to others feel sympathy and compassion for the family members of the child or the young adult.

It hurts judges when juveniles refuse to comply with court orders that state that they must take their psychiatric medications on a regular basis as their psychiatrist has prescribed for them. They must report to court-ordered psychotherapy on a regular basis so that the court and the psychiatrists can understand the juvenile's medical condition.

The student must understand that the local law enforcement agency, the parents, and the doctors want the students to stop fantasizing about causing harm to himself or herself and/or to others. Students must understand that the criminal justice system does not allow schools to graduate students that will be disintegrated and will disappear after graduation.

The courts should work with all schools to save our student's lives. The courts and the schools have been unsuccessful in helping millions of graduates from facing incarcerations in prisons and in psychiatric facilities. Parents, educators, and the courts must come together to do a much better job of keeping all our undergraduate students and graduate students out of incarceration through criminal justice intervention that will eventually end when our kids, young adults, and adults will understand that God in no way tolerates violence towards oneself and/or towards others.

We must teach our children and young adults to voluntarily comply with requests that they should be taking psychiatric medications if it is to their benefit so that they will not have to face a court after the student has tried to hurt himself or herself.

Risks of Rejecting Ordered Treatment

A juvenile that rejects court-ordered treatments may be subject to very stiff disciplinary actions. The students may be detained in psychiatric facilities against his or her will. The student may face arrest if there is evidence that he or she has committed a crime. He or she might be suspended or expelled from their grammar school or from their high school. The student might not be able to work in any job.

Parents must understand that their children must comply with court orders. They must help their kid or young adult to understand how to take psychiatric medications regularly. The parents must make sure that the son or daughter will continue to comply with court-ordered psychotherapy. Parents must be involved in helping their kids and young adults to get top-quality psychiatric medical care. They must be sure that their kids and young adults can comply with the court-ordered psychiatric care and psychotherapy.

The goal of psychiatric treatment is to try to correct problems in the behaviors of our students who have been diagnosed with psychiatric illness to help them to lead the best possible life when they recover from mental illness and when they learn to live with mental illness.

The criminal justice system must work with our medical community to save the lives of our kids and young adults so they will enjoy happiness after graduation. They can look forward to a bright future if they can work with psychiatrists, therapists, and the criminal justice system.

A Total Detachment from Reality

Some students can become so ill that they can fall away from reality. That is also true for students that have graduated from college. These students would benefit from a psychiatric hospitalization.

Law enforcement officers might have to get involved in a young adult that has either is totally detached from reality or that is a threat to himself or herself and/or a threat to others.

Law enforcement officers must protect the safety of a child or a young adult psychiatric patient by committing the child or the young adult into a psychiatric facility. The officer would do that to protect the safety of the kid or young adult, the safety of the patient's family, and the safety of the community.

A total detachment from reality is a state of mind where a student has no idea where he or she is located. They have no idea where they are located. They do not know how to talk to someone so that they can get help.

A police officer would see this juvenile and would call an ambulance to take him or her to the local emergency room that that the young adult can get evaluation and medical treatment there. They make the decision as to whether to commit the student into a psychiatric facility at that point.

A total detachment from reality happens when a patient with a psychiatric disorder does not want to take his or her medication properly. The young adult or adult may also have a severe undiagnosed psychiatric disorder.

We want patients to have these problems to live with their families and not as a homeless drifter or in incarceration.

Suspect Attempts to Hurt Another

Any effort by a child or a young adult to inflict an injury against either family members or other police officers is subject to be arrested and incarcerated in a juvenile detention center, a prison, or to be committed into a psychiatric facility.

The worst mistake that a child patient or young adult patient can make would be to inflict an act of violence upon another person. The patient may be arrested and taken to prison rather than to be committed into a psychiatric facility depending on the severity of victim's injuries.

Some patients that take psychiatric medications lose track of reality. They destroy themselves in one moment by committing a crime like murder or an armed robbery. They lose their freedom for the rest of their lives. That is what really hurts about psychiatry. Doctors and psychotherapists try hard to save their patient's lives. However, there are times when no amount of help can save a chronically ill patient.

We must teach kids and young adults that take psychiatric medications to try hard to refrain from having fantasies about using violence against others. We must warn them about the consequences that await them if they continue to think about others. We must teach them to think about working with God to love people and not to be detached from God to hurt people.

Possible Life-Threatening Injuries

Those patients that have psychiatric disorders can suffer life threatening injuries. Others that are associated with patients may also suffer life-threatening injuries.

Some patients can fantasize about hurting themselves secretly for an extended period without being detected by family members or by educators in school.

There are many ways that a patient can use to hurt himself or herself. They can use illegal drugs. They can abuse alcohol. They can use a weapon. They can starve themselves by not eating for long periods of time. They can neglect their hygiene. They can take an overdose of pills. They can use a weapon to stage a bank robbery.

We must be able to detect when a juvenile is threatening to inflict a life-threatening injury upon himself and upon others. The goal is always to help the student. We are not out to destroy a student. We are not out to inflict injuries upon the mentality of the students. We are not trying to humiliate a student that is flirting with inflicting injuries upon himself or herself and upon others.

We must be forgiving when law enforcement officers must commit a student into a psychiatric facility for trying to inflict life-threatening injuries upon himself or herself and/or upon others. We can pray for the student. We can ask God to intervene in the student's life. Students, educators, and family members must work together to try to save the student's life.

Everyone must convince the committed student that their life is worth living. We must convince them that they can recover from what they have done wrong because God and everyone else has forgiven the student for what he or she has done wrong.

We must encourage the committed student to pray and to regain the ability to pray to God of support and guidance.

A Psychiatric Facility Is Safe

It might be a good idea for any student that has a chronic psychiatric disorder to initially be treated in a psychiatric facility where the hospital staff can protect the juvenile from inflicting harm upon himself or herself and/or to inflict harm upon others.

Doctors can safely experiment with various treatments while they diagnose the juvenile's psychiatric disorders while knowing that the juvenile will be unable to hurt himself or herself and/or to hurt others during the process of diagnosing their illness and finding the correct medications to treat the illnesses.

It is better to be in a medical facility if a juvenile patient has an adverse reaction to any of the medications that he or she is taking so that he or she can get emergency medical care if their psychiatric medication make them sick.

Psychiatric facilities should encourage their patients to pray for help and to look to God for guidance and support so that they will emerge from their suffering as constructive members of Humanity without being a threat to themselves and/or to anyone else. God tries to guide psychiatrists to do a good job of saving patient's lives while they try to get help in psychiatric facilities.

Students and The Criminal Justice

Students Need Guidance

Our criminal justice system has an obligation to provide guidance for our students. Our students should begin to understand the difference between right and wrong at a very young age. Students must understand the consequences of committing crimes when they become young adults. Young adults should work with the Criminal Justice System to understand how it punishes criminals that must be disciplined for the crimes that they commit.

Our criminal justice system has an obligation to prevent incarcerations and to prevent juvenile delinquency. Our students in public schools, private schools and religious schools must understand how to commit crimes and how not to commit crimes. Our criminal justice system must be committed to guiding undergraduates in our grammar schools and high schools to face lives of freedom and happiness. Our students do not deserve to be so naïve that they will commit crimes and will face incarceration for the rest of their lives.

The goal of the criminal justice system should be to guide our young children and young adults to make sure that they have the highest possible chance that they will escape committing crimes, escape becoming a substance abuser, and will lead a good life as a free citizen of Humanity.

Someone must teach all our students how to understand that they must reject a life of crimes. Our Criminal Justice System must help our student to reject substance abuse and all other types of crimes. Our Criminal Justice System wants all our kids to grow up to be free citizens of society. We have nothing to gain by persistently finding reasons and excuses to incarcerate God's Children just because they have committed crimes because they did not know any better than to commit those crimes. We need to educate our students about how not to commit crimes.

Students Must Help Fellow Peers

There are times when a student might see a fellow peer in the process of doing something to hurt himself or herself. Perhaps, a student might catch a fellow student with illegal drugs in his or her locker. What should he or she do when he or she catches the fellow peer with illegal drugs in the fellow peer's locker?

Students must understand that God, the Criminal Justice System, and educators will not allow students minors to hurt themselves with illegal drugs in a school. Parents, educators, and law enforcement will eventually detect that a grammar school student or a high school student has been trying to become a substance abuser.

It is important that all students must report that a fellow peer might have a gun, illegal drugs, tobacco, and/or alcohol with him or her on school grounds. Students are obligated to turn their fellow students into their teachers and law enforcement officers when they bring the capability to hurt themselves and to hurt others with them to school.

It is so important for a student to get help for a peer that may be thinking about becoming a substance abuser. Getting a peer life-saving help when he or she is trying to become a substance abuser helps God to get His kids and young adults help in His efforts to get them off dope.

Proper Behavioral Training

We must teach our students to find strategies to stay out of trouble. What kinds of trouble can our kids and young adults get into?

Under aged tobacco use is illegal. It is illegal for any adult to encourage an underaged minor to use tobacco products. We must discourage kids and young adults to stay away from tobacco.

It is illegal for a kid or young adult to use alcohol. Our young adults could get arrested if police officers catch them drinking alcohol as under aged minors.

It is illegal to be in possession of a firearm. Our students should know better than to be in possession of a firearm in public places. Being in possession of a firearm without a concealed firearm license can cause a kid or a young adult to become arrested on the spot.

No kids or young adult would want a police officer to see them participating in a drug deal. A police officer that sees kids and young adults participating in a drug deal can be instantly arrested.

What kind of kids and young adults can use illegal drugs. We must teach them to reject drugs from the time that they are toddlers. We must teach them about the dangers of drugs to save their lives. We do not want our kids or young adults to be incarcerated at any point in their lives.

Our kids and young adults should know never to work in an off-the-books job. We should warn them that working in an off-the-books job can destroy their lives.

We must train our kids and young adults so that they can enjoy a lifetime of freedom without facing incarceration, indictments, and arrests.

“To Serve and Protect”

A police officer’s job has nothing to do with arresting criminals. The job of a law enforcement officer is to protect the community from all threats that might appear against the community.

A law enforcement officer gives our kids and young adults their warnings. Stop it with the drugs. Stop it with the gangs. Stop it with the off-the-books jobs. Stop it with the drug parties.

There are some kids and young adults that appreciate the advice that they get from law enforcement officers. There are also those kids that do not care about warnings from law enforcement officers. The kids and young adults that care about the way that law enforcement officers try to help them have a better chance of succeeding in life. The kids and young adults that do not care about the way that law enforcement officer seek to help them find themselves spending a lot of time in incarceration.

“To Serve and To Protect” is all about trying to keep kids, young adults, and adults out of prison. It is not about the need to incarcerate others. It does not designate an excuse or an authorization to use a gun with the intent to injure and/or to hurt anyone for any reason. It is about a police officer that risks his or her life every day to protect the kids, young adults and adults in a community from all threats that might appear against them. It is all about an officer’s love for the community.

Police Officers Are Our Friends

There are not that many law enforcement officers out there that are remotely serious about having a need to arrest kids and young adults. Our police officers love the kids and young adults of a community. Our officers want our kids and young adults to part of the communities that the serve for the rest of their lives.

Police officers give kids that want to get into trouble advice in front of their parents or in front of their guardian. How do kids and young adults get into trouble?

Drug parties that gangs operate for young adults and adults infuriate local law enforcement. Young adults get into big trouble when law enforcement arrests them at these types of social events. Most of the trouble that kids can get into these days are related to getting drugs and dealing drugs.

There are times when we must go to a police officer when we know that a good friend is doing dope. We know that he or she is failing quickly. It hurts us to be the one to go to the police to talk about the way that he or she is killing himself or herself.

Police officers than must get that substance abuse help by admitting him or her into a psychiatric unit or a substance abuse rehabilitation facility. They do not want to incarcerate a young adult for doing dope. They want to help the young adult to get medical treatment so that he or she can go off dope.

It is part of the job of law enforcement to care about all the members of their community. We must respect the sacrifices that they make to keep us safe and to protect our families and our neighbors.

Criminal Justice and a Second Chance

Judges appreciate the honesty of a suspect when he or she pleads guilty to the commission of a crime. Judges want to be merciful with kids and young adults that commit crimes. Judges want the experience that kids and young adults face as a warning of what might happen in the future if they do not learn their lessons.

Juvenile offenders need behavioral counseling. They need possible psychiatric treatment. They need to take courses about the consequences of incarcerations and other penalties that follow when a young adult becomes a career criminal.

It is not fair that kids and young adults get absolutely no instruction about law enforcement and the criminal justice system. They deserve to understand the consequences of dealing drugs. They need to understand about what happens when you drive under the influence of alcohol. They need to understand what happens when you rob a bank.

Our young adults need to understand the damage that substance abusers cause to their relationships with their parents, siblings, boyfriends or girlfriends, and kids. They need to understand that we live in a society where God does not allow us to continue to hurt ourselves forever. God will eventually get us help for something life a substance abuse problem. God may have us arrested in the process. God inflicts stiff penalties upon us for breaking the law. However, we get a second chance to rebuild our lives depending on the gravity of the crime that the kid or young adult committed.

Conclusion

An End to Student Incarcerations

God becomes ill when His under aged students face incarceration either in a juvenile detention center or in a psychiatric facility. We must understand that our goal with God's kids is to treat them for their behavioral disorder as outpatients. We must not allow them to disintegrate to a point when they would need an admission to a psychiatric facility or an incarceration into a juvenile detention center.

We do not accomplish anything by incarcerating a minor. It is a waste of time that makes a student's life even more difficult and harder to manage. God does not want our students to lose their education by spending time in incarcerations. God wants our parents, courts, and educators to forgive our students for what they have done wrong. God wants our students to get help for the psychiatric condition that would lead them to commit a crime or to break the rules.

There are high-risk students that can show the intent to commit crimes for an extended period. We must do everything that we can to save the student's life. Saving a student's life will not happen in a psychiatric facility or in a juvenile detention center. Saving a student's life will happen when we treat the student for psychiatric problems as an outpatient.

We need to show high-risk students that God loves them. We need to show these students about the advantages of loving God and of communicating with God through daily prayer. We need to show our kids and young adults that God is a lifesaver and that He will look to save us no matter what we have done to offend Him as children and/or young adults.

A big part of helping our students is to help the student to find the existence of God that loves him or her. That should be part of a treatment plan that would include psychiatric treatment and psychological counseling. This would be a much more productive way to help students than to commit the student into incarceration. That is why God wants incarcerations to stop.

An End to Juvenile Crimes

God wants to be a part of everything that our kids and young adults do with their lives. It hurts God so much when one or more of his kids and/or young adults is detained and/or arrested for committing a crime.

God loves our kids and young adults. God wants to work with the Holy Spirit to help His students to understand that they cannot just assume that they can commit crimes without facing the consequences of committing crimes. God wants our students to understand what is a crime and what is not a crime. God wants our students to be trained as law enforcement recruits. They need to know what they could do to destroy themselves before they make the decision to finally do something that might cost them their freedom.

God is determined to work with the Governments of Humanity to end juvenile crimes and juvenile incarcerations. God wants our students to enjoy their freedom. God wants them to receive psychiatric treatment if they become a threat to themselves and/or a threat to others. God always wants His kids and young adults to have a second chance at life. God wants His kids and young adults to know what a crime is and how to prevent yourself from committing many types of crimes.

How Do We Save Juvenile's Lives?

One of the missions of the Criminal Justice System should be to work to save the lives of all our children and young adults. How do we help our students to understand that the Criminal Justice System loves them and wants them to enjoy their freedom for the rest of their lives?

We save our students' lives by educating them about the realities that happen out on the streets. We teach them how illegal drugs can kill them. We teach them about what serving life in prison would be like if they would use a firearm to commit a crime. We could save a student's life by encouraging the student to seek psychiatric care and psychological therapy. We can teach the students that Humanity loves them. Our kids and young adults do not want our kids and young adults to disappear to disappear into incarceration.

We must save the lives of our children and young adults by bringing the presence of God and of the Holy Spirit into their lives. God and the Holy Spirit can help students to understand that they hurt themselves and the hurt others when they commit crimes. Our kids and young adults want to bring happiness and joy to their family members, to their educators, to their peers, and to God. That is why God exists in their lives. God wants them to make the world a better place for all of us.

Our kids and young adults severely hurt us when they either express the intent to commit a crime or carry out the commission of a crime. They disrupt the happiness of the Humanity by doing something to hurt themselves and/or to hurt others. We must help our students to have sympathy for their loved ones, for their educators, and for God by asking them not to try to hurt themselves and not to hurt others. They should seek psychiatric treatment when they feel like hurting each other and like hurting others.

Young Adults Accept Help from God

Children and young adults get into trouble all the time. They might break school rules. They might break the law. They might not do well on exams.

It is important for students that get in trouble with the Criminal Justice System to know how to go to God to get help. Students need God's help when they may be facing disciplinary action for what he or she has done wrong. We must warn students that their individual relationship with God warns them to be intelligent and to not break a rule and/or to break the law. God is supposed to be able to guide students away from malicious and destructive behaviors that might result in arrests, expulsions, and suspensions.

God and the Holy Spirit are probably more forgiving and are more patient than the Criminal Justice System. They really love our kids and young adults. They want our kids and young adults to survive a catastrophic failure that may include an arrest and a detention in a psychiatric facility or in a psychiatric facility.

God tries very much to help our students to be logical and to stop them from wanting to hurt themselves and/or to hurt others. God is a very strong force in our lives. We must teach our kids and young adults that it is very important for them to go to God for help when they make near-fatal mistakes. Our kids and young adults must respond to God when He tries to save their lives by keeping them from hurting themselves and from hurting others. God wants our young adults to live safe lives.

Criminal Justice Promotes Freedom

The Criminal Justice System has nothing to gain by incarcerating anyone. Putting someone in a prison does not change the fact that a convict felon has done horrible things that have injured Humanity.

What happens when our kids and young adults commit crimes? We want to discipline them in a way that will help them to stay out of prison and juvenile detention. We want to discipline our kids to help them to understand what they have done wrong and that they cannot continue to do it again.

Destroying a young adult's life by taking him or her from his or her education to put him or her in incarceration is cruel and unusual punishment. That means that the juvenile that has committed a crime will never can work because the Criminal Justice System has broken or terminated the juvenile's education.

We must be more patient and more merciful with juveniles that want to commit crimes. We must understand that these are kids and young adults that need help. They need guidance. They need counseling. They need God and the Holy Spirit in their lives to promote intelligent behaviors in them. God and the Holy Spirit must work with the Criminal Justice System to promote freedom for our kids and young adults and not to promote incarceration for them.

We want to preserve the freedom of all of God's sons and daughters. We want to work with God and with the Holy Spirit to make that into a realizable goal. God does not create babies to have a destiny to face incarceration. God creates babies to forever be a loving part of our Human Family.

God does not want our parents to suffer because a son or a daughter has faced incarceration. We want to rebuild the juvenile and his or her family so that God's suffering will end. We also want the family's suffering to end.

Early Lessons: Right versus Wrong

We need to begin to teach our children the difference between right and wrong at a very early age. We must teach kids in the first grade how to communicate with God through prayer. We must start helping kids to understand the difference between right and wrong when they are in the first grade.

Early help and education for our young kids would be the best way to keep them from emerging to be threats to themselves and threats to others. We must train our young kids to reach out to God through prayer so that God can guide our kids away from harmful activities and from harmful intentions to hurt ourselves and to hurt others.

It takes time for our kids to learn the difference between right and wrong. However, it is better for our juveniles to learn the difference between right and wrong at a very young age when they have not done anything to break the rules or to commit a crime than to teach them the facts of life after they have been arrested and incarcerated.

Our kids and young adults need to find God in their lives. They need guidance from God and from their parents. They need to feel love from God and from their parents. We need to help them to do the right things even before they will do something wrong.

Graduates Cannot Face Incarceration

Our schools are not designed to prepare graduates for a life of crime and for a life of incarceration. Our schools cannot prepare our graduates to become criminals. Our schools cannot see destructive behaviors in students and to say “So, What. The student is no longer our responsibility when he or she graduates. If the students wind up in prison, it is because that is what they deserve for what they did here in this school. It is just a bad thing to think about.”

That is a very destructive attitude that is very rude and is very offensive. Teachers must care about what will become of our grammar-school students and of our high-school students after they graduate. They hope that these students will find a way to get jobs and to pursue an academic career. We hope that the student will be mature enough to avoid being in trouble with the Criminal Justice System.

We hope that graduates will not resort to becoming substance abusers, drug dealers, and/or drug kingpins. We hope that our students can find happiness with a partner that is consistent with their sexual orientation.

We are always hopeful that our educators taught our graduates the right way so that our graduates will not be candidates for the transmission and the infection of sexually transmitted diseases. We should encourage all our schools to make sure to provide adequate training and education to our students about the dangers that exist regarding sexually transmitted diseases.

Our students in grammar schools and high schools need to know the truth about what dangers can destroy their lives out there so that they will be able to face those dangers responsibly.

God Is Part of the Criminal Justice System

God and the Holy Spirit supervise every court in the world. They work to understand practically every case that comes before courts and judges throughout Humanity. Judges answer to our Supreme Being. Judges and God must come to peace with each other in the way that judges do their jobs.

Working for the Criminal Justice System is all about trying to understand the difference between right and wrong. It is about understanding that someone has committed a crime and that the courts cannot allow the same person or persons to continue to keep committing the same crimes systematically over time. A rampage of crimes must stop. A judge must incarcerate a suspect when the judge has no choice.

God has a personal relationship with each judge in the United States. God helps them to write opinions of cases that make sense and that are constitutional. God help our prosecutors and judges to understand why a certain course of action would be constitutional or would be unconstitutional. Judges must write opinions that disrupt the entire Criminal Justice System throughout the United States because of a single case that can set a precedent for future cases.

God wants to make sure that only those that are guilty of committing crimes will face incarceration. God does not like false arrests. God does not want anyone to go to face the Criminal Justice System if that person has not committed a crime. God loves all of employees of all the Criminal Justice Systems of the United States. God wants them to work to save lives by using incarceration as a last resort and by preserving the freedom for felons that we take for granted.

The Criminal Justice Intervention

The Criminal Justice System must intervene in our struggling schools to save our high-risk students to have a chance to lead a normal life with a job and with a family. God wants the Criminal Justice System to sponsor criminal justice seminars in all our schools that will teach our students the realities of living a life of crime and of the intent to hurt others.

The Criminal Justice System must care more about teaching our students in grammar schools, in middle schools, and in high schools from committing crimes and by hurting themselves and by hurting others.

Why is it that we cannot sponsor criminal justice courses and seminars for all our students that might benefit from the warning? The warning is simple. You will go to prison if you continue to commit a crime like drug dealing and/or money laundering. Your days are numbered if you think that you can commit crimes without facing the anger of the criminal justice system. These instructors would warn our kids and young adults to not think that they could continue to retain their freedom and to repeatedly commit crimes at the same. The instructors must tell our kids the truth. You will go to prison if you continue to commit crimes.

Some judges authorize search warrants for a home that is suspected to belong to a drug dealer or to a drug kingpin. The judges must intervene in that situation because it is illegal for anyone to deal drugs out of their home.

Some judges need to authorize a wiretap. This means that law enforcement agents can listen in on all the suspects phone conversations to collect evidence in an investigation.

Some judges order a grand jury to be formed to see whether someone should be indicted after a long-term effort to collect evidence against the suspect.

These are some of the ways that the Criminal Justice System intervenes in our lives.

We Will Achieve a Final Peace

The Criminal Justice System will eventually work to save lives and not to take our brothers and sisters away from us into incarceration. The Criminal Justice System will provide support, supervision, and counseling to all our students that will need extra help in trying to understand concepts such as substance abuse, gangs, incarceration, violence, psychiatry, law enforcement, and our criminal justice system.

Our schools will no longer graduate students that would be at high risk to achieve incarceration in prisons and psychiatric facilities. Our schools will train them to reject the commissions of crimes. Our graduates will reject alcohol and illegal drugs. They will reject the ownership of firearms.

Our graduates will no longer tolerate violence and chaos in our communities. Our graduates will help our communities to be free of drug dealers and to be free of assaults with deadly weapons and to be free of wrongful deaths. Our graduates will work with our educators to send a clear message to our undergraduate. God loves you. God will no longer allow you to hurt yourselves. God will no longer allow you to hurt others. We will work for our students and educators to make sure that our young adults will get the message very clearly. Our graduates have a higher level of respect for our judges.
